## January Presentation

# Finding and Fishing for Wild Native Trout

Paul Pezza was kind enough to give Crossroads Anglers a very informative and beautiful slide presentation on finding and fishing for wild native



trout in our area. He uses the Picket Pin steamer fly as his main search fly (shown above). Below are instructions on tying the Picket Pin. *Please note Paul does not use hackle and the herl head on his flies.*

Material's needed:

- peacock herl
- gold wire
- brown wet fly hackle
- gray squirrel tail (trapped, shot or purchased)
- black thread
- size 10 or 12 streamer hook (or nymph hook for more gap)

Crush or remove barb to aid release of these wild fish. Tie in gold wire at bend of hook, wrap up 1/16" and tie in five strands of peacock herl and the tip of the brown hackle. Wrap thread down the hook shank to 3/16" of the eye of the hook, add head cement to the thread body and twist herl, wrap herl onto wet head cement thread – to strengthen body – and tie off at end of thread. Wrap the hackle palmered style over the herl and tie off. Wrap the gold wire to make a gold tag and then spiral down the body to lock in the herl and hackle. Add a bunch of squirrel tail as a wing and use head cement locking it down (this is important as squirrel tail does not compress well and is prone to pull out). Add four strands of peacock herl, twist and make the head, finish head and add cement.

A few winds of fine thread over herl head will add strength. To add weight, add a strip of wire under the shank of hook to keep the body slim. 🐟
