FROM THE PRESIDENT:

It is true; twenty percent of the fishermen catch eighty percent of the fish. How do you become a better fly fisher? You need to start thinking like a fish. Striped bass are interested in three things, eating, not being eaten and making more striped bass. Water temperature is very important early in the season so look for areas that warm up early, shallow bays and estuaries. Current and moving water key fish into feeding; if you are five feet outside of a seam you will not catch fish. Look for areas that hold bait and what type of bait does it hold. What are the fish feeding on; bait changes as the season's change? A beach may look barren but explore it at low tide look for depressions, channels, rock formations and current seams. Older smarter fish have learned how to get the most calories with expending the least amount of energy. Fish will hold in boulder fields and in areas just out of the currents looking for bait being carried to them by the current. Large bass will hold below actively feeding schools of smaller fish and pick up what drifts to the bottom. If you want to catch large fish ignore the feeding blitz, let your fly sink to the bottom and twitch it like a dying fish. I am a firm believer in using large flies, large fish will be triggered into going after a large fly. Sunlight means that fish can be seen so if you want to catch more fish get out of bed. I have found that the most productive times for me are ninety minutes before and ninety minutes after sunrise. Bass will come into very shallow water and I have seen people throwing flies out into deep water when the fish are feeding behind them close in to shore. Above all put in the time not every outing will be successful but every outing will be a learning experience, fly fishing is a thinking man's sport.

MORE BAD NEWS AS IT RELATES TO STRIPERS:

Officials seize net holding three tons of rockfish; Poaching sting is largest in 25 years fish worth about \$15,000.

Natural Resources Police seized an illegal fishing net filled with nearly three tons of striped bass Tuesday morning off Bloody Point at the tip of Kent Island.

It is believed to be the largest single illegal netting of striped bass in a quarter of a century. The haul, with a market value of about \$15,000, was so large that the 25-foot patrol boat had to radio the 73-foot buoy tender M/V J.C. Widener for help.

"My gosh, I did not expect this many fish," said Cpl. Roy Rafter, who spearheaded the operation that began Monday afternoon and continued overnight. "It's overwhelming."

Total of 10 tons of illegally caught striped bass found over three days

Natural Resources Police discovers two more large loads of rockfish late Tuesday and Wednesday

For the second consecutive day, Natural Resources Police officers pulled illegal nets from the Chesapeake Bay Wednesday filled to the brim with striped bass. In total, they have seized 10 tons of illegally caught fish, the largest haul of its type since the end of the rockfish moratorium more than two decades ago. After detecting poachers' nets Monday night, patrol boats with grappling hooks snagged nets near Bloody Point at the southern tip of Kent Island Tuesday morning, Tuesday night and again Wednesday afternoon. They pulled up 2.8 tons, 3.5 tons and 3.5 tons.

After surviving a storm in my journey in life. I moved to Mansfield with new beginnings. One of my favorite stores to visit was the Mansfield News on Main Street. I would go in to see the latest fly fishing magazines. I noticed other people looking at the same magazines. I made the statement if you keep reading these types of magazine you won't get into trouble. I introduced myself and quickly made friends with Norris Johns and Jim Manning. I was surprised they didn't know about Rhody Fly Rodders, United Fly Tyers and Trout Unlimited. Yet they loved fly fishing.

In 1993, I was convinced that there were enough fishermen to start a local club. The parking area was not plowed. I got home at 11:30 that night. That was the beginning. It continues today and the spirit lives on.
